

e've found ourselves in the midst of a unique time in history that has thrown us all for a curve. Whatever our plans were, they've either been cancelled, shifted or have evolved into something else entirely. With our whole world rocked by change, the driving factors of colour and design 'trends' as we've known them have also been hugely disrupted.

Our mission is now one of care, both for ourselves and our greater community – and we need colour trends, inspiration, ideas, rooms and spaces that embrace this. More than ever, there is a desire for soothing and calming spaces in our homes, but we also need spaces that are stimulating to spend time in – much more time, perhaps, than we might be used to.

It's this, more than anything else, that will be the primary driver of decorating trends for the foreseeable future. Whether you're looking to alleviate stress, work from home more comfortably or just want to mix things up, these relevant Resene hues will get the job done beautifully.

Coffee break

Changing times require changing measures. With the popularity of cool greys slowing, colour palettes are showing signs of warming up. Beige and taupe are becoming the 'new' go-to neutrals offering dreamy elegance, while the retro obsession of recent years has helped to quietly sneak in pops of brown décor. But now that we're in the new decade, it seems we've reached a tipping point for chocolate hues to make a bigger splash. The future looks brown – but we promise that declaration is much better than it sounds!

One reason why brown is on the rise may stem from a desire to shift away from the pinker and redder palettes that have been pervasive. Warm terracotta hues like Resene Crail and golden beiges like Resene Blank Canvas are maturing, and browner tones have begun to come forward as a natural progression of those hues. The overall demand for increased sustainability and our growing need to feel more connected to nature also makes brown a logical candidate for decorating. This hue previously experienced strong popularity in the early 2000s and in the 1970s, so its current upswing could also be attributed to a sense of nostalgia for those times.

Brown, according to colour and psychology experts, also stands for stability, reliability and safety. It reminds us of simpler times, recalls ancient rituals and brings to mind a more down to earth lifestyle. Brown is natural, comfortable and familiar, easy to bring in with timbers and plays well with a wide range of colour schemes.

Unlike other trending colours, it isn't just one particular type of brown that's been dominating; cocoa, cinnamon, caramel and creamier coffee colours are all gaining traction. Look to Resene Americano, Resene Hairy Heath and Resene Kabul as particularly hot options, but don't rule out bringing in touches of Resene Tide, Resene Alpaca or Resene Rebel to provide interest and contrast.

Cool blue hues

In lives full of busyness and interruptions, blue helps us filter out the noise and focus on what truly matters – bringing with it that much needed sense of calm and stability we all desperately crave. Like many other trending colours, today's popular blues are dusty in nature – like a sky just before dusk, such as Resene Nepal, or a favourite pair of well-loved denim jeans, such as Resene Seachange. This move toward desaturated shades has been slowly occurring across the spectrum over the past few years, in large part driven by our desire to return our homes to calming, restful spaces.

Top trending blues have also taken on green undertones with Resene Green Meets Blue, Resene Ziggurat and Resene Awash being among the most covetable variations. Try them with muted smoky grey blues like Resene Blue Bayoux, pale greened whites like Resene Celeste or mercurial greys like Resene Mountain Mist. For a pop of interest, bring in a flash of bitter orange, rich ochre or peridot green such as Resene Mai Tai, Resene Tussock or Resene Flourish through small accents to finish the look.

Back to nature

In our fast-paced world and 'always on' culture, most of us yearn for ways to disconnect. Our homes have now, once again, become the most meaningful place Opposite: Stone greys and camel browns work wonderfully as accents to olive greens. Walls in Resene Waiouru, cabinet, small table, tray and accent battens in Resene Gravel, floor in Resene Quarter Spanish White and vases and accessories in Resene Clover, Resene Dingley, Resene Gravel, Resene Highland and Resene Black. Sofa and chair from Me & My Trend, rug from Città, throw and cushions from Shut the Front Door, art from Simply Creative.

Resene Breathless

in our lives; one that may also have to do double duty as a workplace, but still needs to facilitate rest and rejuvenation.

While nature itself has long been a common inspiration for home décor, woodland tones including silvery sages such as Resene Bud, muddy stone greys like Resene Gravel and olive greens such as Resene Waiouru are among the most popular trending hues.

Luckily, these shades are all suitable for building tonal looks – an approach which is still very much on trend. Since tone-on-tone schemes are built on layering, the more you add, the more the whole scheme will hang together. The trick is to pick hues that complement with enough variation to keep things from becoming completely homogenous, and earthy greens like Resene Rivergum and Resene Mangrove are particularly excellent to work with when you're trying to create a serene space but don't want it to lack in interest or contrast.

Soulful neutrals

Given the efforts to turn our spaces into more relaxing places to spend time, we're embracing living a more clutter-free and thoughtful life. Shades associated with minimalism, such as creams, beiges, greys, taupe and whites, have always been popular choices for anchoring interior colour palettes.

Those looking to add comfort to their homes should pass by cold, flat greys and opt instead for warmer, soulful neutrals. Look to nude taupes like Resene Tea, greiges like Resene Stonewashed and warm stone greys like Resene Napa for the base of your colour scheme, which will bring that little extra 'something' to your space thanks to their subtle undertones.

Even whites have gotten creamier, and those that feature more colourful undertones have become desirable for their inherent simplicity that can also be manipulated with different types of lighting. Resene Quarter Spanish White – a timeless cream that shifts dramatically richer and deeper as the sun sets – is a reigning favourite for this reason. Try it with beige neutrals like Resene Blanc or deep dusk greens like Resene Warrior.

Feel-good hues

While they're not for everyone, yellows and pinks do the job like no other when it comes to bringing cheeriness to a space.



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Building a scheme anchored with soft buttery vellows like Resene Mellow Yellow or Resene Chenin is an easy way to add a refreshing burst of optimism to your home. Yellow is also known to bring out the best in other colours, so if your current scheme could use a pick-me-up, what better way than with a cheerful corn-coloured cushion, picture frame or throw? Use softer shades like Resene Sweet Corn and Resene Manuka Honey as accents to duck egg blues, earthy greys or olive greens like Resene Duck Egg Blue, Resene Schooner or Resene Quarter Grey Olive. Or, stick with classic mustards like Resene Cleopatra with sapphire blues, greyed whites or coffee browns.

Pinks can also be comforting. Soft sunset shades like Resene Wafer, Resene Ebb or Resene Cashmere are hugely popular and work well on walls in winddown spaces. Try them together in a tonal scheme or with accents in a sage green like Resene Peace and a deep inky blue like Resene Indian Ink. H



originally purchased their 1901 villa in 2009, and they embarked on their first renovation a few years later.

"At the time that we bought the house, we only had Lottie, who was six months old. It suited the needs of our small family then, but by 2012, our family had grown with the arrival of Esther and Tom. The house worked okay while the kids were really little, but once they were all at school and much more independent, the house wasn't functioning how we needed it to," she says. "We looked at moving, but we couldn't find anything suitable within our budget and in close proximity to school - so that's when we decided to renovate."

"Our large living/dining room was originally situated where Tom's room and the master bedroom are now. We installed a partition wall between the living and dining room, creating a new bedroom space - which we desperately needed."

Their previous home was full of bold colours, which Annick loved, but she was ready for something new. "I still wanted to use colour, but through a much more refined and mature palette. I'm also a lover of wallpaper, so I knew I wanted to use wallpaper in some of the

rooms for colour, texture and interest. It was important that the house felt modern, light and fresh, but I also wanted to bring back the beautiful character features that the previous owners had removed."

"My kids are also not great sleepers, so I wanted to create rooms that were restful and calming but were still fun and reflected their personalities. I knew I wanted the upstairs living spaces to feel light, fresh and airy while I wanted downstairs to feel cosy and relaxed."

The results were spectacular, and Annick was thrilled. But it's been nearly eight years since the family's initial reno wrapped, and you know what they say about idle hands when they find unexpected extra time – Annick picked up some new Resene colours and got stuck in to repainting everything that had been giving her those niggling feelings.

First came the laundry, which went from white to deep and dusky Resene Rocky Mountain. It's since joined ranks among Annick's very favourite Resene > Opposite: The walls, architraves, skirting boards and elegant detailing in Annick's airy bedroom looks extra chic in Resene I Do. colours. Next came the kitchen island.

"When we renovated, I had always planned on painting our timber floor white, but as this was one of the last things to be done in the reno, the budget annoyingly ran out," she says. "Unfortunately, I had planned my bleached oak and arctic white kitchen cabinetry – ordered months prior to installation – around having a white floor. The floor we have is rimu, so even though we've sanded it back, it still has a slight orange hue - and it didn't blend with the bleached oak cabinetry, which drove me batty. Given that painting the island was far more budget friendly than painting all the floor, I opted to paint the island cabinets and back in Resene Nocturnal. It's not a true black, so it still has warmth to it and doesn't contrast the other white cabinets too severely. I love how it defines the kitchen now."

But once she spun around to face the living area, something was missing. Out came the dropcloths and rollers and on went Resene Balderdash on the two walls and bulkhead that wrap around behind the sofa. For balance and levity, the tongue-and-groove panelled accent wall in Resene Wan White and the ceiling and architraves in Resene Half Black White stayed as they were. After that came son Tom's bedroom, with a brand new wallpaper and a ceiling and crown mouldings in Resene Bismark. While she loved his old colour scheme in Resene Kangaroo, he had definitely outgrown it.

no wallpaper? no problem!

Annick shares some handpainted wallpaper hacks and handy decorating advice.

ver fall in love with a design from the Resene Wallpaper Collection and then feel disheartened to find that it is no longer available? Many popular designs sell out quickly while others get discontinued after two to three years to make way for newer collections. With a little time and patience, there are many Resene Wallpaper Collection designs that can be achieved with paint. Annick shows how to recreate the look of the wallpaper designs in her daughters' bedrooms.

On the dot

"To recreate Esther's wallpaper design, I started with two basecoats in Resene Wafer. Next, I used a ruler and level to draw a grid, with lines 5cm apart in both directions. Then, I used a large round artist's brush to 'dot' Resene Double Alabaster on each of the grid's intersections in two coats. But you don't need to be too precious with the placement of your dots – it looks even better if you take a relaxed approach."

Sweet scallops


"To get the look of Lottie's wallpaper design, I painted a basecoat of Resene Double Alabaster first. Once that dried, I traced a large dinner plate to create an overlapping circle pattern. You can choose to go big like I did or go smaller and more detailed. Using a round artist's brush, Resene Chelsea Gem and a casual, free-spirited approach, dot around the bottom edge of your round outlines. Then, add a second or third ring inside each one."

Annick's top decorating tips:

- Aim for a neutral base in communal areas and let art and potted greenery add interest and colour to the space – but go for a character neutral like Resene Half Truffle instead of white for warmth and richness.


a toasty bedroom for maximum relaxation



Designers **Alice and Caleb Pearson** suggest this alternative scheme:

The master bedroom should be a haven within a home. For us, that is created through subtle earthy tones and clean lines – which really means a simplistic, uncluttered space – and soft textured accessories that feel great. To achieve this, we selected Resene Eighth Thorndon Cream for the walls; a sharp white with an inkling of green hidden within. To elongate the stunning large windows and ornate trims, we used Resene Half Ash, added dramatic full length white linen window coverings and hung glass amber pendants from the ceiling. To visually ground the room and give a nod to the heritage of the home, we stained the hardwood floor in Resene Colorwood Dark Rimu with a Resene Qristal ClearFloor 1K satin finish. For the furnishings, we added a metal four post bed and delicate black bedside tables then brought in natural elements with linen bedding, a jute rug and wool throw to complete the look.

a rich and regal work-from-home set up



Designer **Georgia Langridge** suggests this alternative scheme:

The key to a great home office is finding balance between personality and warmth without creating distractions. In this room, I've done that by paring back the refinement but turning up the texture. I wanted to further accentuate the room's height by choosing a dark, rich timber stain, Resene Colorwood Banjul, on the flooring to ground the space and bright white on the ceiling to leaven it. Vertically, I've used a variety of neutral tones, including Resene Half Alabaster, darker grey Resene Surrender and mid-tone Resene Iron to connect the two and create further depth and texture. The furnishings are relatively minimalist and gender neutral, but with varied lines and forms to add interest to the space. For warmth and softness, I have added a plant and layered sheer drapery on the windows, while a quirky pen holder and paperweight serve both practically and decoratively to make the space more personable.

Resene Woodsman Uluru hether you prefer to host more populous parties or fancy more intimate affairs, when the mercury is on the rise, so too is the desire for social gatherings to spill out into outdoor areas. It's common to think that a few extra chairs are all you need to make your outdoor space ready for hosting a do, but there's a lot more to outdoor living space design than many realise.

Not only will leveraging a few fundamental design principles help it look good, it'll increase your ease of entertaining and up the comfort of your guests – and, thus, the success of your party. Here are some key considerations for making your outdoor space ready for your upcoming occasions.

Divide and conquer

Similar to an open plan layout indoors, many outdoor spaces don't have fixed structural walls to divvy them up — and nor would you want them to. You will, however, still want to build a sense of intimacy and ambience. Therefore, the best approach is to apply the same strategy to your outdoor entertaining space as you would inside: divide it into zones for different tasks.

While the number and type of zones that you break your space up into will vary depending on the area you have available and how you want to put it to use, some key zones you'll likely want are a zone for preparing food, a zone for consuming food and one or more conversation zones. There are a number of strategies you can employ for cordoning off those areas without closing them off completely, but they all come down to your furnishings and layout. Everything else you choose to do will be the icing on the cake.

Flexible furnishings

It may go without saying that everyone is different, but it can be easy to forget that different people will find different types of seating – and different seating arrangements – more comfortable than others. So not only does having flexible outdoor furniture make it simpler to add or remove seating as your headcount expands or contracts, it also means that guests will have more choice when it comes to where and how they'll be sitting while they socialise.

If you're holding a larger gathering, unless you're putting on a true al fresco dinner party, you likely won't need a seat for every guest. Just like with indoor house parties, many people prefer to stand while they chat and mingle with others. It's also unlikely that everyone will arrive or eat at the same time – your barbeque can only cook so much at once, and when the queue for the food is long, some people will hold out for a shorter wait. That means that several people may end up using the same place at the dining table throughout the course of the meal.

Trying to cram everyone into one big circle (especially when food is involved) seldom works well for big gatherings. Instead of making everyone feel included, this arrangement often does the opposite as guests are too spread out to speak to one another. If the person beside them is already engaged in conversation with someone else, some guests may feel left out and even bored.

Whether you're doing dinner or just drinks, for smaller gatherings, you probably will want to provide a seat for each attendee. Sofas are great for people who like to cosy up, but if your guests aren't family or friends, it can be uncomfortable or intimidating for invitees to have to sidle up to someone they don't know. This is where individual armchairs and the almighty titan of outdoor entertaining – the beanbag chair – come in handy.

Occasional seating shouldn't be without a place for guests to rest their plate or glass so it's a good idea to have some flexible tables – especially at a height that will suit the seating type. Look for items that can be upcycled to be smaller table surfaces like wooden >

crates, old fashioned suitcases or even a section of tree trunk. And, there isn't much furniture out there that you can't add castors to, which can be especially helpful for manoeuvring in and around informal seating arrangements. Just make sure the ones you choose are up to the task of rolling over your deck or patio surface, holding the weight of whatever they are carrying and have optional brakes so that they're stable when you need them to stay put.

Screen time

If you don't already have a lattice or two in your backyard, then it's high time to purchase some. An open framework made from wood or metal that features a crisscross, diamond-shaped pattern, lattice is one of the most useful materials that can be leveraged to carve out distinct zones and create visual interest within a greater outdoor area. Plus, it's affordable and lightweight so it's great both for more permanent and temporary uses. You can buy it in framed or unframed sheets and turn it into a whole range of fun and practical DIY projects.

Attach two or more framed lattices together using hinges and paint in coordinating Resene paint colours to create a folding screen divider that can separate spaces within a larger outdoor space. It'll add to the sense of intimacy for your guests, create privacy and you'll be certain that its colour will complement your home, deck and the rest of your home's colour scheme. A few strands of sparkling string lights go a long way in dressing up an outdoor dining area, especially when they're strewn from your new lattice divider. If you're clever, you can also use framed lattice to create an affordable pergola – and what better ambience than enjoying company and conversation under a canopy of greenery and twinkling lights?

Aesthetic agility

Once you've nailed the all-important aspects of zoning and layout, it's time to dig into the details. Design principles that are often used to make your interior look great should be put to work outside, too. Think of ways to create repetition through colours or textures.

The types of gatherings that you will be hosting should definitely affect the type of décor you invest in. After all, a birthday party for kids and a cocktail party for grown-ups demand quite different décor. While some of that might be more ephemeral decorations, it's worth thinking higher ticket décor items, too. A particularly pricey throw cushion might be safe around adults but you may need different options to put out for situations that are more prone to spills or sticky hands.

If your furniture features an element of soft furnishing – definitely recommended if you're looking to amp up the comfort factor outdoors – you may not realise how much of an impact that the colour of your sofa and armchair cushions can make on how inviting your outdoor living space looks. Make your sofa the focal point by playing up the colour of your squabs through décor and accessories painted to match and coordinate. If you've got storage space to spare, there's probably nothing stopping you from having two sets of décor for different occasions or weather.

While we're on the topic of weather, be sure that your outdoor décor also takes the elements into account. Protection from the sun or rain in the form of umbrellas, pergolas or marquees are a must, as are heaters, fireplaces and throws for cooler weather and evening entertaining. Pick options that coordinate with the rest of your décor choices.

Colour wise, there aren't many outdoor items that can't be made to coordinate with a fresh coat of paint. Most Resene testpots are made with Resene Lumbersider, which is designed to be durable for outdoor use without the need for a clear coat. Use Resene Colour

Three ways with breeze blocks

Strong and flexible, these landscaping staples can be used for much more than garden beds. Try one of these projects with blocks painted in a couple of coats of Resene Lumbersider to complement your colour scheme and protect them from the weather:

- Use them as a barrier: have a builder or stone mason stack and grout breeze blocks vertically to create a barrier or divider for added privacy around an outdoor social space.
- **Use them to build a bench:** line up a series of breeze blocks horizontally to form a decorative front base of a bench and cut structural plywood to size to create the rest of the bench.
- Use them to build a raised planter box: stack and grout breeze blocks both vertically and horizontally to form a four-sided planter box lined with plywood cut to size.

Unless you are using them purely decoratively, be sure to choose breeze blocks that are structurally sound enough – and properly anchored and secured – for the project you're making.

Opposite: Whether inside or out, having the right lighting is essential for setting the mood. Try hanging a pendant lamp if you have a covered space, adding sconces to walls or strings of LED lanterns to trees or bushes. Items with wheels or castors, such as carts or movable tables, will make it easy to adjust your layout to better suit your gathering. Squeaky clean

Hitting the beach or having a pool party? Building an outdoor shower will allow you and your guests to rinse off without having to set foot inside – which will help keep sand outside where it belongs. When you're not entertaining, you'll likely find an outdoor shower equally useful for rinsing muddy dogs and grubby gardening equipment.

But remember, placement is important. The closer your shower is to where you can tie it into existing water lines, the easier and more cost-effective it will be to install. If you don't want your outdoor shower to be directly beside your house, solar showers are another warm water option without the hassle of connecting it up to your pipes. Instead, they can be attached to a garden hose.

You'll also need to consider where the water will drain. Be sure to seek advice from a professional plumber to sort out where your runoff will go as you need to mitigate the potential water damage to nearby structures and the impact on ground surfaces to meet building codes and your local council's regulations.

Design wise, there are plenty of creative ideas out there to dress up your outdoor shower. You could paint or stain it in your favourite Resene colours, either in a solid colour or an attractive pattern. Or, go for a rustic look with Resene FX Faux Rust Effect; it's a waterborne coating used to create a rust style effect on both exterior and interior surfaces. Once applied, it looks like rust – a look that will continue to develop as the coating ages. H





Cubby cache

If you find yourself with a messy mudroom, a lick of paint could be the solution to the disarray in your entryway. These painted stripe storage areas not only provide much needed space for each child to stash their shoes and outdoor gear on their own handy hook and in their own convenient cubby, but they also work as a place to leave helpful reminders. The secret is Resene SpaceCote Low Sheen, a durable interior paint which doubles as a chalkboard. Or you can use Resene FX Chalkboard Paint. You can tint it to your favourite Resene hues (though it's darker shades that show chalk best) and simply wipe it down with a damp cloth whenever you need a clean slate. Simply measure and mask the width of your cubby - we added a few centimetres on each side of ours - and then roll on two coats of your chosen colour to get the look. For a crisp line, be sure to use high-quality painter's masking tape (available from your local Resene ColorShop) and remove it as soon as your final topcoat is dry to the touch.



hen you're building your 'forever home,' it can be difficult to design it in a way that's forward-thinking enough to take your potential future needs into account. It's hard for many able-bodied people to imagine a time when maintaining their independence could ultimately come down to their home's layout, or whether their doorways are wide enough for a wheelchair or walker. But then there's couples like Deanna and Marcel, whose visionary thinking blows the rest of us out of the water.

Their enlightened concept took an existing 1940s cottage with a swimming pool on a large, steep site on the Kāpiti Coast and saw it evolve into an airy modern home that not only accounts for their own current and future needs, but also the future needs of others.

"The homeowners have a vision to create a >

small retirement complex in the future that spreads over the three titles that form their parcel of land," explains Wellington-based architect William Giesen, who was responsible for the design. redevelopment of the existing house and reconditioning of the swimming pool was within this broader vision, and their home could one day act in part as the central communal space for the entire complex."

Seeing it now, it's difficult to imagine that the original cottage was ever there at all. It has since swelled to house three bedrooms and ample living areas within a striking contemporary shell. But William's design team was mindful of the history of the house, the existing landscape and native trees which have been maintained - and sought ways to incorporate materials from the cottage within the new build.

"We enlarged the existing building to increase its connection to the pool then added a gallery entrance space, which links into the new two-storey addition that is designed to be able to act as a separate apartment. It offers the chance for the couple to live independently from the main section of the home if required in the future."

The roofline of the original cottage was mirrored through a new gable, which extends alongside the pool to house the office, guest bedroom and bathroom. This elongated structure also acts as a barrier to protect a new poolside lounge that overlooks

the Tasman Sea and Kāpiti Island.

"The existing gable was also extended to the east to form a new entrance gallery and act as a buffer space between the communal living areas and the new addition," he adds.

Coming up with the overall look and a Resene paint palette to suit was a joint effort shared between the homeowners and the architectural team. Together, they decided on a subdued scheme with splashes of blue added for impact. Sophisticated yet not at all stuffy, their choices bring an inherent warmth to the updated home.

"Deanna and Marcel really like blue, and their garden," says William, "so the interior was developed to focus on bringing in highlights of that colour within a neutral palette. The strong blues and soft neutrals were inspired by the mature trees nestled around the site, which also overlooks the everchanging Tasman Sea. While blue hues can be found throughout the home, the kitchen, bathrooms and doors are the areas and elements with the most intensely concentrated colour."

Resene Allports, a deep-toned cerulean blue, was chosen to link the house to the swimming pool, sea and open skies beyond. This colour was used on the kitchen cabinetry as the reflection of these two bodies of water into the house while Resene Guru, a Persian-inspired turquoise, boldly enhances a number of the interior doors.

To balance and complement the intensity of the >

blues, a palette of natural materials, including timber flooring and trims, whitewashed plywood ceilings and custom millwork are offset by walls in Resene Half Merino, a light and versatile off-white with a green oxide undertone that brings in a hint of the greenery that surrounds the home.

Of the finished results – at least until the next phase of their plan is underway – Deanna says she and Marcel love it all. "I still get a thrill walking into the bathrooms and going up the stairs."

William singled out the integration of the existing swimming pool as one of the project's most successful elements. "It has worked really well with the living room, which opens in two directions: to the pool and into a secluded and sheltered rear courtyard area."

For others with grand ideas of their own, Deanna offers this important advice: "listen to your architect, but still maintain your own initiative and ideas. Starting with a solid base will allow you to personalise it with your own style and colours." H





The design of this living space was inspired by the gorgeous design of Resene Wallpaper Collection 386531, which I've chosen to feature on the ceiling. I wanted to create a room that challenged the boundaries of design while also having a focal point that sparks joy. The dusky pink I've used on the walls, Resene Blanched Pink, creates a calming feeling without being overly feminine. The addition of the moss green side chair creates a simple colour palette which is accentuated by the textured rug, slate grey couch and wallpaper design. The large windows bounce light around the room, bringing a bright and airy feeling to the space. This gave me the confidence to add the darker tones to the ceiling without the risk of shrinking the room too much. My hope is that this gorgeous space will appeal to a wide range of tastes, challenge the traditional view of wallpaper being confined to walls and showcase an impactful alternative.

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

wkward dinner parties: we've all been there. Even if the drinks are flowing, unless your guests are close friends – or at least acquaintances – there's bound to be a point in the evening where the small talk runs dry.



Fresh, fun and fabric-inspired

A few playful pops of colour are what punctuate Amy and Mark's eclectic contemporary kitchen and take it far beyond your typical white kitchen in terms of style and flair. The redesign of this character-filled space was part of a recent tip-to-toe renovation of their classic 1960s weatherboard home. After looking around at other houses for the better part of two years, the couple chose to stay put because everything else just seemed to pale in comparison. They adored their property with its big,

beautiful backyard plum tree and the cul-de-sac it sits in, which is surrounded by lovely neighbours and lots of kids for their two young children, Levi and Hazel, to play with.

As it often happens with spaces that have been thoughtfully decorated, the colour choices in the reconfigured kitchen look effortless – but Amy assures us that was far from her reality.

"I bought what felt like about 50 testpots," laughs Amy. "I struggled to find a starting point because I felt like I couldn't choose the paint before I chose the bench tops, which I couldn't pick before I'd chosen the tiles, which I couldn't choose before I'd confirmed the colour for the panelling, which I couldn't choose before the upholstery and curtains and so on. I was going around in circles thinking that I'd just do everything white. But then I found the most beautiful fabric which I used to recover two armchairs that my parents bought when they got married nearly 50 years ago and that became my 'red thread' for the design."

The fabric works a treat to unify the Resene Sea Fog cabinets, Resene Rock Spray drawers, outward facing Resene Saratoga tongue-and-groove panelling and Resene Cabaret dining table surrounded by Resene Alabaster walls, trims and ceiling. Amy has also used it to inspire other colours she's chosen in adjacent areas of the home, including a hallway and fireplace surround in sunny Resene Pizza.

While the colour palette is undeniably reflective of the new upholstery, it also mirrors Amy's shining personality.

"It's just me! I've always loved bright colours and I think what we've chosen reflects our family really nicely and gives our house character. The colours just really make us happy," she says of the results.

For those struggling with their own colour selections, Amy recommends taking your time to make decisions. "Our renovation took four months and I probably looked at colour samples every day until it was time to make my final choices. Definitely take home plenty of testpots and samples so that you can look at things in different lighting."

Silvery sage green and bitter orange, which feature prominently in Rachel and Shane's stellar kitchen space, have been on the uptrend as popular colours to decorate with, but it was actually the couple's penchant for all things mid-mod that led them to select their kitchen's stunning colour scheme.

"We love all things mid-century and wanted our colour choices to be unique, bold and unconventional," explains Rachel. "As the main living areas are essentially all open plan, we needed a colour palette that would work for the entire space." The Karen Walker Paints colour range provided just the right colours. "Inspired by the Bauhaus School of the 1920s, it combines colours from an emotional point of view rather than a technical one, and we grouped them in a way that tells a story rather than simply matching them tonally. It's perfect for our little retro home, and we felt confident in the knowledge that everything would work together!"

The hours that the couple spent doing their homework trawling through library books, Pinterest, television shows and era-appropriate films is evident in the kitchen's design details, as is their commitment to their original vision. The pop of orange on the cabinet

uppers, painted in Resene Clockwork Orange, brings the space to life and ties in with Rachel and Shane's bold front door while soothing Resene Smoky Green on the walls works as the perfect counterpoint. A ceiling and trims in Resene Ecru White is the ideal colour to complement it thanks to its slightly green undertone and plays off the white bench and stool tops to create a cohesive look.

If you share their love for mid-mod style, Rachel recommends really doing your research before embarking on your own design. "The term 'midcentury' spans decades of design, so finding the version of it that suits you – both practically and aesthetically – is key. Pick a colour scheme that works for your lifestyle and reflects your personality. And when it comes to furniture, look out for key vintage pieces and invest in those.

"And don't be afraid to go all out once you settle on a style or colour scheme you love. One of our favourite moments was during a meeting with the kitchen team when they told us our design was completely impractical but exactly as it would have been done back in the day. That was when we knew we'd gotten our house right." H

A look behind the curtain at what goes into making Resene's colour charts and fandecks.

ave you ever taken a close look at a Resene colour swatch before? Unless you are a design or paint professional, you may not have even realised that the colour you are holding isn't just a highly accurate representation of what your chosen paint hue is going to look like – it's the real thing. You also might not know that Resene's commitment to providing true representation of their paint colours on their swatches, charts and fandecks is quite unique. In fact, Resene is the only company in Australasia who Color Communications Inc Australasia (CCIA) produces charts for who uses their own actual paint on their colour chart swatches.

It's to be expected that when you're producing something that no one else is, especially on a large scale, there is a lot of extra effort and specialised equipment that is required to see it through. But much of making it happen comes down to two key individuals: Dianne Connell, Resene's Colour Controller, and Dean Viljoen of CCIA.

As Colour Controller for the past 30 years, Dianne is the one who maintains the overall control of Resene's meticulous colour standards. Every two years, she works with Resene's marketing team to monitor the progression of colour trends and identify the hues that will make up the latest edition of the Resene The Range fashion colours fandeck and helps to update other charts or create new ones as needed. It's a big task, one that includes researching potential new colours, selecting which ones will get mocked up, working through the laboratory formulas and approving proofs of the final colours. Each fandeck takes over 12 months from first research to finished fandeck.

While Dean has 12 years under his belt helping Resene with their colour cards, colour systems and



colour marketing tools, CCIA have been manufacturing these items for more than 30 years. All those years ago, Resene was their very first customer. Operating out of East Tamaki, Auckland, CCIA is a leader in the manufacturing of colour marketing tools for the decorative and industrial markets across the Asia-Pacific region, including colour cards, colour swatches, fandecks and complete colour systems.

"The manufacturing of colour systems is complex, and each step in the process requires a very high attention to detail to maintain the necessary level of quality," says Dean.

Each new or updated Resene colour chart or fandeck begins with a plan. Dean and CCIA liaise closely with Dianne and Resene to set the parameters for the project, including the type of colours required, layout, artwork, printing and quantity specifications, to name a few, to determine everything that's required for manufacturing.

"There are many stages in the manufacturing process, but it all starts with getting the colour right," Dean explains. "While there are some charts where we use specialty paints like Resene FX Metallic and textures. Resene SpaceCote Low Sheen paint is used for the majority of the swatches we make for Resene."

Dean and Dianne collaborate to make sure each hue meets Resene's exacting colour standards. The colours are proofed using a given film thickness and substrate, then the mixed colours are measured on a spectrophotometer before undergoing a careful visual check. Adjustments are then made until the correct colour is achieved.

"Once the colours are approved by Resene, they are ready for the next stage – which is the coating process. This is done on a purpose-built knife over roll coating line. The coating process uses continuous rolls of various substrates and coats the paint using a precise and constant film thickness. The paint then passes through a heated oven to ensure it is fully dry before it is cut into sheets at the end of the coating line.

"The next steps of the process include cutting the sheets into paint chips, printing, creasing, finishing, slitting, mounting and packing – each process and the time it takes is dependent on the type of colour chart or fandeck being produced, the number of colours and the quantity we're making. Manufacturing a chart from start to finish generally takes about eight to ten weeks but can take much longer."

> So, the next time you hold a Resene colour swatch in your hands, take an extra moment to marvel and appreciate that that little rectangle has made quite the journey and passed some pretty scrupulous standards to make sure you'll know exactly what you'll be bringing home in

Most paint companies use printer ink colour matches on their colour charts? Printer ink performs differently under lighting, compared with paint, due to the different make-up of the materials – this is called metamerism. By using real Resene paint on colour charts, the colours look true to colour so what you see on the Resene chart you will get on your wall. 

eing a 'tween' is tough. Too cool for kiddie stuff but not quite ready to live the teen dream, tweens are caught somewhere in the middle. They long for more recognition and responsibility but still need the time and space to just be a kid. It's a balancing act, and a tricky one at that.

Designing a room for a tween can be tough, too, but finding that age-appropriate sweet spot starts with investing in more grown-up furniture and bedlinen and picking a less kiddie colour palette to suit. The cute animal masks used to decorate this room were made using air dry clay. It usually dries in about 24 hours and does not require kiln firing or baking, making it a great weekend project.

like form out of plasticine – which won't dry out during your project – and cover it with a piece of cling wrap to keep your mask from sticking to the form. Be sure to add a little extra clay at the top of your mask so that it will be thick enough for the screw of your eye hook. Embed the hook while your clay is still wet, then leave your project to dry.

When your clay no longer feels damp to the touch, it's time for the fun part – decorating! Pick up some Resene testpots in a range of colours of your choice. n a nation surrounded by ocean, chances are that if you don't own a boat yourself you probably know someone else who does. And as kids young and old wait in bated anticipation for the next America's Cup competition, the excitement for all things sailing is especially heightened right now. Translate that enthusiasm into a fun and graphic room theme anchored with favourite Resene paint colours, Resene Sea Fog, Resene Explorer, Resene Tangaroa, Resene Raging Bull, Resene Pirate Gold, Resene Half Black White and Resene Black.

Make waves

This stylised wave wall is easy to achieve. Start with an aptly named canvas with two basecoats of Resene Sea Fog. Once dry, measure two thirds of the way up your wall and draw a line across using a pencil and a level. Then, line up an overturned dinner plate with one corner and the top of the pencil mark and draw a circle around it. Continue drawing circles next to one another all the way along your line. Next, use an eraser to remove the bottom half of every other circle and the top half of each one in between so that you end up with a wavy line. Use this as your guide for painting. To get a clean edge, use a wide high-quality painter's brush - one with plenty of bristles - to fill in your curves with Resene Explorer and work slowly. Feathering the bottom edges of your brushstrokes downward will help keep your painted finish smooth. Then, fill in the remainder of your wall with a roller. Once your first coat has dried, apply your second topcoat.

Flag it down

Starting with two basecoats of Resene Lustacryl tinted to Resene Half Black White, use high-quality painter's masking tape, a testpot brush and Resene testpots in Resene Tangaroa, Resene Pirate Gold and Resene Raging Bull to create the look of nautical flags on dresser drawers. We decided to paint a random assortment of flags that we liked the look of, but since each flag represents a letter of the alphabet, you could even spell out your child's name or a secret message!

Work on one colour at a time and apply two coats before removing the tape. Allow the paint to dry fully before moving on to your next colour.

Put a ring on it

Add additional charm to your child's nautical themed room with a rustic, ropey life preserver. Starting with a paper mâché or polystyrene wreath form, wrap the entire surface in thick cotton rope, tacking it down with hot glue as you go and tucking in the ends. Then, cover the entire surface in two coats of paint using a testpot in Resene Raging Bull. Finally, create a ring of rope that's a few centimetres larger and bind it to the outside of your wreath at 12, 3, 6 and 9 o'clock and tack down the ends of each section with hot glue.




Decorate your child's room with one of these adorable garlands by draping them across their headboard, along the top of their window frame or above their desk.

For the block garland, mask off areas of 35mm³ balsawood blocks and paint on your flag designs using Resene testpots in Resene Tangaroa, Resene Pirate Gold, Resene Raging Bull, Resene Half Black White and Resene Black using the same approach as the flag dresser. Once the paint has dried, drill holes through the centre of one face of each block and string them together with cotton cord. Then, knot the cord on each side of the blocks to keep them in place.

If you're a whizz with nautical knots or know how to macramé, you can make this buoy garland out of natural cotton string and paper mâché or polystyrene balls painted in two coats of Resene Raging Bull. **H**



ny designer worth their salt will tell you that lighting is one of the most essential ingredients for a well decorated space — not the afterthought that many of us consider it. The right lighting has the power to completely transform the way a room feels, lift your spirits and make you more relaxed or productive.

However, because great lighting design isn't necessarily as obvious as other elements in a space, such as wall colours, furniture, flooring, window treatments and statement decorative accessories, it often gets forgotten about until everything else has been decided upon. By this point, the budget has usually been spent elsewhere and you can't afford to do it justice.

Interior designer Anna Major of Haus of Design (www.hausofdesign.co.nz) says there are a number of reasons why it's crucial not to leave lighting to the end of the design process. "Lighting is an element that affects your senses, so to not value it highly in the building phase is a really common oversight. If the space feels dark and poorly lit, it will ultimately impact how you live in the space and how you enjoy being in it."

If lighting is an aspect that you don't feel confident planning for yourself, Anna stresses that it's especially important and worthwhile to make sure your electrician is good at planning and has a good understanding of what is out there in the marketplace. "And if you aren't sure that the electrician is quite understanding your vision, then it would be best to engage an interior designer to make sure your feature and task lighting are appropriately planned."


"While it's not impossible, it is definitely more difficult and expensive to make lighting changes once the house is lined," she says.

Another reason is that lighting plays a big role in how your chosen paint colours look. Even if your room is well lit by natural light, you can still run into some serious decorating challenges if you're not taking that lighting into consideration when you're picking out your paint colours.

"For a lot of people, there is still the idea that using the same colour internally in all of the rooms will be the safe way to go," says Resene Colour Expert Carolyn Atkinson. "There is the expectation that if a colour looks perfect in one room it will be exactly the same in all rooms. But due to the directional aspect of natural light and its effect upon colour – yes, even true white – and how differently each direction makes a room feel, this generally isn't the case."

You can't always bend your natural lighting conditions to your will with your colour choices, either. To try and make dim or cool rooms look warm, sunny or inviting, Carolyn says it's common for homeowners to choose soft yellows or crisp clean whites.

"However, in a south facing room, soft yellows can alter to a green or sour tone that doesn't achieve the desired effect, and the white can look grey and icy instead of fresh and bright. Resene Quarter Moonbeam is a good example of a yellow that can pick up a sour or green tone in easterly or southerly light." But under

Resene Hermitage other lighting conditions, it can be fresh and fun.

In the case of complex neutral colours, the underlying base tone like yellow ochre, brown umber or orange may suddenly take a warm, inviting beige or taupe tone and turn into something dirty, sludgy or moody. Too much low westerly sunlight can bring up the dirty tone while too little sun coming from the north can grey off the colour, because the light comes in from higher in the sky and makes shadows on the walls. Resene Bison Hide, for instance, is a gorgeous complex neutral, but it can look sludgy in light coming in from the south or west.

"Without careful testing of large swatches – which should be A2 size, at minimum – and watching how the predominant source of natural light works with or against the colour, there is the very real chance of it being a disappointment."

This is true also of paint on the exterior, says Carolyn. "I recently wrote to a homeowner who said that her exterior colour looked perfect except on the front of her house, which had a westerly aspect. She thought that some chemical reaction to the paint that she was using was the reason the pale cream she'd chosen looked peachy and her beige looked khaki. It can be difficult explaining that there is nothing wrong with the paint or the colour, but some people are surprised when they see just how much a hue can change in natural light.

"There really are no shortcuts to finding the right colour. Bringing home Resene testpots to see the hue in situ is the only way to go."

While natural sources are one component, the artificial lighting that will be in your space is another factor entirely, so it's highly recommended that you

have your electrical plan in place before making the final call on colour.

"Paint colours are far more adaptable than lighting colours," says Anna, "so I would definitely approach it that way around.

"The advantages to picking the lighting first is that you can factor in practicalities. Doing it this way means that you need to be considered about your paint choices, but you'll have a huge wall of options at your Resene ColorShop to choose from to get that right."

If you do need to select your paint before your lighting, Anna suggests heading to your local lighting showroom with your paint samples. "They can demonstrate some good examples of different lighting tones to see how they affect your paint selections."

It's all in the mix

Different spaces call for different lighting, and that can vary greatly between the places in your home where you get ready, where you revel and where you relax. Unless the room you're lighting is a literal closet, you're going to need more than one source of artificial lighting in it.

It's best to take a layered approach to illumination, starting with your ambient overhead lighting then mixing in more directional and specific accent and task lighting. "That way the space will mould to your requirements at different times of the day," says Anna.

In a living or dining room – which, thanks to the popularity of open plan layouts, are often located within the same four walls these days – it's ideal to start with a large ceiling fixture above central points of activity, such as the sofa or dining table. Then, look toward the outer walls for downlighting that can gently wash the walls, curtains and art with warm, functional brightness. This can be achieved with soffit or valance lighting, or even upward facing floor lamps that bounce light off the ceiling.

Depending on your room's layout, accent lights could be used to highlight art while table lamps could be placed beside seating to add another layer of light to turn on when reading and socialising. And for extra ambience, a few candles never hurt.

"For bathrooms, task lighting in front of your face is always a good option, and the rest of the room needs to have strong lighting in terms of lumens," says Anna. "I like having natural white LED lights in bathrooms as it has a nicer feeling than a direct cool white.

"For media rooms, you will still want to have a small amount of light in there so having some low level LED

top tip

Your paint's sheen level will also pick up lighting differently. Gloss finishes will reflect more light and the colour will seem brighter while low sheen and flat finishes will diffuse the light and the colour will seem deeper. You can use this to your advantage – a glossy front door will be eye-catching, while a flat deep finish in a bedroom will be cocooning.

Use mirrors to help reflect more light back into spaces that are painted in dark hues.

strip lights is a really nice option as it floods the floor with a gentle soft light, but it won't distract from your TV or media unit."

One room where brightness should be more important than ambience is the kitchen. Try installing recessed lights along the edge of the ceiling to flood the space. If you have a kitchen island, consider hanging pendants overhead, which will light the space without taking up room you might need to eat or prepare food. Also, you'll have straight sightlines to your guests without having to bend and peer around a hanging light.

And don't forget under-cabinet lighting: running LED light strips on the bottom of your upper cabinets is the easiest way to create an evenly lit counter space for food prep and cooking.

A bit about bulbs

The last piece of the lighting puzzle is the bulbs (or 'lamps') that you use in your fixtures or light fittings.

"The Correlated Colour Temperature (or CCT) of lamps can have an impact on how the light reflects and portrays your paint colours within a space. A lower CCT of 2700-3200 kelvins creates a warm and cosy feel, presenting wall colours with yellow and orange undertones. A higher CCT, such as 4000-5500 kelvins, creates a cooler more energising effect, producing white and light blue undertones. Keep this in mind when you are selecting LED lamps for your light fittings," explains Julia McKerrow of Lightingplus (www.lightingplus.co.nz).

"The lower the CCT, the warmer the light effect will be. With darker paint colours, you won't notice the light effected undertones I mentioned. However, you will need approximately 30-50% more light to achieve the same light levels as compared to lighter paint colours.

"It's also important to identify the suitable maximum

lamp wattage in any given light fitting. If you exceed the maximum wattage, there is a high risk of shortening lamp life, premature failure or blowing an electrical circuit. The new low wattage, energy-efficient LED options available help to minimise these risks. All light fixtures should have maximum lamp rating labels so you can identify lamp type and wattage."

"Interior designers are really worth talking to also if you are trying to pull together paint, lighting, flooring, etc.," says Anna. "This is something we do all day, every day so we can definitely save you all that time researching products, lighting and paint when we have all that information at hand.

"You should also hire a good electrician. They should be able to guide you through a few options and possibly show you some examples for lighting."

"Beyond that, being really clear in your own mind about how you like to use each space, which colours make you feel calm and how your house could best serve the way you live is really helpful for making your decorating decisions. If you are clear on that, then choosing lighting and colours should feel natural and easy."

Since ceilings are more in shadow than other parts of the room, if you want your ceiling to look lighter than your walls, choose a half or quarter strength of your wall colour. If you use the same colour as your walls, your ceiling will look darker.

Full circle

Even something as simple as a painted circle can be all it takes to define and bring character to a corner where you can curl up with a book within the context of a larger shared room.

To get the look, you'll need a small nail or tack, a length of string (that doesn't have any stretch to it) and a pencil. Figure out where you want the centre of your circle to be and hammer the nail gently into the wall there. Then, cut a length of string slightly longer than the radius of the circle you'd like to paint. Tie one end of the string to the nail and the other to the pencil, then keep the string taut and the pencil perpendicular to the wall to draw your circle. Remove the nail, patch the hole and sand it smooth. Work slowly and use a high-quality brush to paint a nice clean edge along the inside of your circle, then fill in the rest using a small smooth surface paint roller.

In this reading corner, inspired by classic film noir, layered tones of grey create a sophisticated desaturated look that's as much a live-in piece of art as it is easy on the eyes. Breaking boundaries

When using a block of colour to create a 'zoned' area within a larger open plan space, there's no reason why it can't eschew traditional boundaries.

Make a stylish statement by bringing your colour block around a corner, on to your floor, over architectural details like architraves or panelling, on to a piece of furniture – or even a combination of all four.

vicious spikes or thorns," says Rachel.

She estimates that they removed at least 90% of the plants before replacing them with native varietals. They also removed the spa pool and water feature and built a deck in their place. "We wanted a garden that we could all relax in and that our children could play in without supervision."

One of the things the family likes most about the yard are the different levels. "We built the deck on the upper level, and when you sit up there with the palm trees hanging overhead and the parakeets nesting above, it feels like you are floating on your own private little island. The different layers really give the yard a sort of resort feel."

Steven and Rachel are both big fans of creating 'zones' or delineated spaces both indoors and out – after all, that was a driving factor in maintaining the original layout when they renovated the inside of their home. "We adore the separation of the new garden. The garden was designed to suit the era of the home,

so it has a distinctly art deco feel to it with lots of curves and rounded edges." The retaining walls were also given a stucco finish to coordinate with the look of the exterior, however, these were painted Resene Stack to provide subtle contrast.



Before you get stuck in to repainting an old stucco or cement exterior, make sure the surface is properly cleaned and in good repair. Start with Resene Bio-Cleaner, which is a quick and easy way to clean outdoor surfaces to get them ready for painting. Then, use Resene Brushable Crack Filler. It's a convenient way to deal with small cracks in concrete buildings up to 2mm wide, which may still be cyclically moving up to 25%. The crack must be wide enough to fill

with the Resene Brushable Crack Filler, depending upon the crack width multiple coats may be needed to achieve a flush finish. Prime hairline cracks with Resene X-200 before topcoating with your Resene finish.

build up height to make an impression




Designer **Dean Philip Saunders** suggests this alternative scheme:

Symmetry and scale are the underpinning elements for this playful modern take on a traditional French provincial aesthetic. A bespoke concrete structure sits proud as the focal point, with an internal vertical moss wall taking centre stage. The concrete patio surface is defined and elevated with a metallic finish in Resene Spark to bring a sense of grandeur to the space. New vertical guardrails in Resene Blackout help delineate the entertaining area from the lower pool garden while the perimeter fence in Resene Waterborne Woodsman Crowshead frames the new garden and accentuates a row of Alnus jorullensis evergreen alder trees under planted with Hedera helix ivy. Low shrubs consisting of gardenia, penstemon, ajuga, liriope, helleborus and alternanthera line the lower pool area to envelop the space and create a colourful European flavour. The exposed concrete platforms, protected with Resene Concrete Conserver, provide an understated foundation while being a functional medium to the overall aesthetic.



Step 1: Measure and mark out squares on your sheet of plywood in the following dimensions:

- 2 x 400mm²
 2 x 280mm²
 2 x 370mm²
 2 x 250mm²
 2 x 160mm²
 2 x 130mm²
 2 x 130mm²
 19 x 100mm²
 2 x 310mm²
- **Step 2:** Using a circular or table saw, cut out your pieces. Wear cutting gloves to protect your hands
- **Step 3:** Using a pencil, measure and mark the centre on the top of each plywood square. Drill a 16mm diameter hole into the middle of all but one of the largest pieces.
- **Step 4:** Sand down the sides of each piece of plywood and around the drilled holes using 180-grit sandpaper. Then, use the wood filler to fill any gaps and help create a perfectly level surface along the outside edges of your squares. Leave to set, then sand the edges smooth. Wipe all surfaces down with a clean, dry cloth.
- **Step 5:** Stain both sides of the two 130mm² pieces in Resene Waterborne Woodsman Natural timber stain. Leave the edges bare to paint later.
- **Step 6:** Working from smallest to largest with your 160mm² to 400mm² sized squares, apply Resene Waterborne Woodsman Riverstone timber stain to the tops and bottoms, starting with a single thin light layer and wipe away the excess stain with a clean, dry rag. Continue to apply more stain as the pieces get larger. This will create an ombre effect, with the darkest and largest layers used for the top and bottom of the table and the colour lightening as the pieces get smaller. Wipe off any excess stain on the layer that will be at the top. Leave to dry.
- **Step 7:** Using high quality painter's masking tape, mask off the tops and bottoms of your stained squares along the edges so that the sides are left open.
- **Step 8:** Using the rest of your Resene testpot colours, paint the edges of the pieces with a testpot brush, starting with the lighter shades in the middle, and going darker as you reach the top and bottom pieces. Repeat the same colour pattern on your $19 \times 100 \text{mm}^2$ 'spacers'.
- **Step 9:** Thread the dowel through the centre hole of your squares to create the stacked table, using wood glue to adhere the pieces together as you go. Use one square of each dimension and work up from largest to smallest, then work from smallest to largest with the remaining squares. Make sure to glue a spacer between each piece.
- **Step 10:** When you reach the top of the table, glue the final piece (the largest, darkest square) on to the top of the table. Leave your project to cure overnight.
- **Step 11:** You can leave your table as is, seal either just the top or the entire table with Resene Aquaclear waterborne urethane in a satin finish to protect it and add a low-level shine. H

Vic Bibby, one half of the powerhouse design duo behind Bibby + Brady, lets us in on where she finds inspiration and her current favourite Resene colours.

How did you two meet and what led you to start your interior design business together?

My background is actually in graphic design and Dael worked in event management in the UK before studying interior design. I had been running an interior design blog when Dael and I met through our children, who were in the same class at school. Dael had finished her studies and knew I was passionate about interior design, so she asked me out for coffee and suggested we start a business together. And that was that! Nearly eight years on, we have built a great little business and a portfolio we're proud of.

Where does your design aesthetic stem from, and do you feel like you and Dael share the same design aesthetic or do you differ on that front?

Our design aesthetic could be described as 'relaxed luxe'. We like to work with high quality furniture and homewares to produce rooms in line with our aesthetic, and to achieve a sustainable design. But we always want our rooms to be inviting, warm and liveable. Dael and I have a very similar aesthetic, but it's always great to bounce different ideas off one another.

Where do you find your inspiration?

I'm kind of obsessed with all things interior design and love to stay up to date with design mags, blogs and what other designers are doing especially overseas. 
You've recently started offering an online colour course. Who would benefit from taking it?


