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
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



avid Bruce knew shortly after meeting his wife-to-be that life was never going to be any shade of beige. Her bedroom at the time featured wooden floors that she'd painted dark red. A poster on the wall carried the message: "You are different", and she'd painted footprints across the floor leading halfway up the wall to the poster.

The Lian Bruce of today has retained that fearless approach to colour, as evidenced in the home she shares with David, their border collie Max, and visiting daughters. Home, in the coastal town of Papamoa near Tauranga, is a white house with terracotta roof that does little to hint at the cornucopia of colour inside.

While there are no painted footprints, there are sumptuous eyecatchers such as a rich-red, velvet chaise lounge imported from Lian's homeland, the Netherlands as well as bold paint, decals and wallpaper.

Feature walls add zing to rooms which are otherwise painted in Resene Alabaster. Doors are predominantly painted in the grey Resene Cloud. A wall in the living room, for example, is painted in Resene Clockwork Orange; the internal double doors leading from the entranceway into the open-plan living area are Resene Wasabi green, as is the kitchen splashback nearby. Adding to the diversity is a deep purple-coloured (Resene Tarot) wall dividing the bed from the walk-in wardrobe in the main bedroom.





Lian, an English teacher and interior designer, firmly believes in the link between colour and emotions. "What is fun about purple hues is that they incorporate the soothing aspects of blue with the energy of red. This is an interesting combination for a bedroom," Lian laughs. Similarly, orange is a good colour for the living room, she says, as it stimulates conversation.

Lian's the first to admit, however, that these colour choices can change in the blink of an eye. "Things are in a constant state of flux. The people at the local Resene store know me well as I change colours all the time. It's not because I am not happy with the way our home looks. It's because it is fun and energising to change and doesn't cost an arm and a leg. For \$50 you can make a significant difference."

may change. I might re-paint it or even wallpaper it."

She says her two daughters are familiar with many shades from the colour spectrum – their bedrooms tended to change colour every two years. One of those rooms recently had a colour makeover. One wall features rough stripes of Resene Picton Blue with Resene Alabaster, Resene Cloud and Resene Clockwork Orange. In the white stripes Lian has inserted text messages such as: "A woman

Until recently, for example, the lounge feature wall was Resene Hot Chile red. And, Lian tells how she instructed the kitchen craftsman to install the breakfast bar's kickboard in MDF rather than veneer. Resene "It's currently Resene Black... is like a tea bag. You never know how strong she is until she gets in hot water."

Lian used a roller to paint the stripes here and in the bathroom. There has been no attempt made to create perfect edges. "You have to have fun with your house and not take things too seriously," is her mantra.

Just as Lian is totally comfortable with a paint brush or roller in hand, she also likes working with MDF. Before her bedroom feature wall was purple it had an MDF bedhead that Lian had painted dark blue. She then drilled 200 small holes into it, into which she slotted fairy lights. "They were like little pinpoints of light and it was a lovely effect," she says.

This creative homemaker (whose business is called Ideas, for Interior Design) is puzzled by people who opt for one paint colour for their entire house. "That doesn't make sense to me – rooms have different functions, different inhabitants and different energies." >

The latest addition to the décor is a photomural, found on one of Lian's favourite websites, www.komar.de, and available through Resene ColorShops. "This spring flower drawing is colourful and cheerful and exactly what I wanted. It offers colour, but not a whole wall of it." The mural provides stunning detail in the entranceway where a chandelier of light bulbs inside a metal basket is the other attention grabber.

In fact, lighting is an art form in David and Lian's home. A large ice cube light from Ikea sits on the kitchen benchtop, a bulb in the office is covered in entangled wire, and balloons suspended from a bedroom ceiling are also light features. "It makes sense to me to create atmosphere through lighting. We drive past some houses at night and I think 'give me my shades'. How is that cosy?"

People say they love the house this couple has built and the home they have created since emigrating from The Netherlands five years ago. When Lian quizzes them over exactly what it is they love, it is the colour they comment upon – "people react to colour." Living in a house without colour is quite simply untenable to Lian. "Yes, I could live with beige," she says, "but only if I could paint over it." H

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



moroccan magic

Stencil a rainbow of delicious Resene colour onto a glass table top for a mystical Moroccan look.

before

You will need:

- A glass-topped table we bought this retro wicker one secondhand for \$10
- 1 litre of frame colour we used Resene Enamacryl tinted to Resene Half Spanish White
- Testpots of the other colours: we used Resene Home Run (green), Resene Pukeko (deep purple), Resene Centre Stage (violet), Resene Butterfly (deep pink) and Resene Clockwork Orange
- Paint brush
- Small pieces of foam
- Masking tape
- Stencils we used Martha Stewart cake stencils, available from kitchen supply stores







final

Step 1

Clean the frame well, and let it thoroughly dry. Paint on two coats of Resene Enamacryl in your chosen colour.

Step 2

Decide where your stencil patterns will lie


and what colours you will use. Measure and mark the placement with pieces of masking tape. We have used a variety of colours but you may decide to use only one, or two. NB: You will be painting on the back of the glass, not the front, so that the paint is protected from wear and tear.

Fix the stencil with masking tape on to the reverse of the glass, and start to fill in your colours, dabbing gently with the sponge. Repeat taping and painting until finished, applying two coats of paint if necessary.

You can use spray adhesive if the stencil is quite complex or you find the paint bleeds beneath the stencil. Spray lightly and let the glue mostly dry before placing on the glass otherwise it won't peel off cleanly. Gently peel off each stencil when finished.



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iving a busy life in a busy city has advantages for executive couple Catherine and Jonathan and their teenage daughter Caitlin, but it can also get a bit too much. Their solution has been to create a home that feels like a refuge of soft, calming hues.

When the couple bought the one-level 1930s bungalow 12 years ago, it had been renovated. Grand, elegant reception rooms with tall ceilings and lovely bowed windows were painted in an all-over, dull cream, which Catherine says made it appear dingy and certainly didn't do it justice. But the couple loved the large property that sits against a hill facing north, protected from southerly winds.

Catherine and Jonathan wanted to retain the charm of the old home and to enhance the character while adding more casual living with an easy flow to the garden. Having owned several houses, they were experienced renovators so were undaunted by embarking on major alterations that included adding a large family room to the rear of the house with doors opening either side into the garden, as well as a guest suite downstairs. Later on, they also built a guest room or office in the garden, and updated the kitchen and bathrooms.

While the rear addition has vaulted ceilings finished in tongue-andgroove for a traditional feel, to unite the old and the new "we were looking for colours that transitioned through the house that didn't jar from one room to another," says Catherine. They didn't want just the one colour throughout the house, however.

It was Caitlin who chose Resene Lemon Grass for the original part of the house, a colour that sounds cool and exotic, yet is difficult to describe as it changes according to where it's placed and what's around it. "It's green tinged, but it's not really green," explains Catherine. They toned it down to Resene Eighth Lemon Grass in the formal living rooms and matched the curtains to the wall colour. This backdrop of continuous colour makes bold pieces of furniture stand out.

Catherine and Jonathan have collected antique furniture, art, rugs and china for many years and have also inherited heirloom pieces. "Both Jonathan and I love old things. We often joke that everything we own is old, including a large teak and mahogany Grand Banks launch from the US that takes up much time spent away from my business."

In the rear addition, Resene Half Robin Egg Blue has been boldly used not only on the walls but on the ceiling as well. Says Catherine: "The painters thought I was mad when I asked them to do it." The effect is dramatic but also very visually cohesive and calming. The chimney breast was painted in the slightly darker tone of Resene Windblown Green to give it more of a dimensional quality.

The blue-green undertones of Resene Half Robin Egg Blue and Resene Eighth Lemon Grass morph particularly well together. These tones are further enhanced with outdoor plantings of olive trees and astelia. Where possible, Catherine and Jonathan chose native trees and shrubs, so there are also pittosporum, coprosma and griselinia, trimmed as neat hedges.





Red accessories and flowers are used as accents throughout the garden. This deck and terraced garden lies beside a separate studio, painted in Resene Double Napa.

For a calming ambience downstairs, the guest suite was painted Resene Half Sandspit Brown and Caitlin went bolder with a pacific-inspired blue, Resene Half Oxygen for her room, enlivened with curtains in a Designers Guild pattern of big, bright tropical fruits. For the master bedroom, Catherine chose a classic burgundy and gold drape.

Accents and accessories in red are used to unite all the rooms. In the older parts of the house, these are rich maroons and crimson. A standout in the lounge is the classic, flamboyant rose-printed Sanderson linen sofa. In the new spaces, rugs, sofas and cushions are in bright strawberry red, orange and rust.

The garden echoes these tones with red-flowered hibiscus, Tahitian pohutukawa and prostrate ratas. Scarlet geraniums clamber along the fence in the back garden, which includes an orchard and vegetable garden as well as ornamental plants with a red theme.

In front of the house, bold sun-loving, red-leafed bromeliads rise up to assert themselves against the home's handsome Resene Double Napa stucco exterior and a fence and stucco cappings crisply painted in Resene Bright Charcoal. Colours that marry both the inside and out ensures an overriding harmony prevails, making this large city home just the tonic needed for city life. H

any people use magazines as inspiration for their decorating choices but Dorothy and Dennis Addison went one step further, virtually recreating a bathroom they saw in a magazine for their old Taranaki farmhouse.

They had already swapped the once small bathroom with the much larger mud room-style laundry before they started looking for ideas on how to redecorate their new bathroom space.

What appealed to them about the magazine photograph was the elegance of the room and the fact that the style would suit their old stucco house. "We needed to keep it in sympathy with the old farmhouse. We wanted it to be clean and airy but not ultra modern," says Dorothy.

They already had a clawfoot bath, which is the only fitting they reused. They had it resurfaced and the exterior painted in Resene Enamacryl waterborne enamel tinted to Resene Triple Masala.

The feature that really caught their eye was the Brocante 11 45932 wallpaper from Resene with its large stylised leaf pattern and subtle colouring. "It adds interest without being too in-your-face," says Dorothy. "The bathroom's not huge so we didn't want to put anything too bold in there. It's elegant. We fell in love with it."

The room had previously had tongue-and-groove panelling to dado height on some of the walls but in the process of replacing the old linings with a waterproof plaster board, that was removed and replaced with new tongue-and-groove, now painted in Resene Enamacryl tinted to Resene White.

Much thought went into the flooring, and whether or not to keep the existing rimu floorboards. In the end, Dorothy and Dennis decided they wouldn't suit the overall look so chose Lavange Anthracite tiles from Tile Warehouse.

A new pedestal basin and toilet carry through traditional styling with



their fluted detailing and bevelled corners. A storage cupboard was cleverly fitted into the space left by an old doorway. To top it all off, a chandelier from Lighting Plus adds luxury and style (there's a smaller version in the guest toilet), while internal timber shutters not only enhance the look but also cover the cream aluminium windows that had been previously inserted into the house.

"We couldn't find curtains that would suit and a roller blind just wouldn't go so we felt the shutters added to the French style of the bathroom. And we couldn't rip out all of the aluminium windows so the best idea was to cover them up." H

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This was a shock to Philip and Carolyn Ivanier when they emigrated from North America where some of these elements are standard. So with two young children and the opportunity to build a new home, they went quite a few steps further - creating New Zealand and Australia's first certified passive home.

With a design by Jessop Architects already in hand, Philip became a man on a mission. Hours were spent researching the types of products he would need to achieve the correct standards. Many were not available locally so were imported, including the profiles for the stunning oak window and door joinery. It's a truly global house.

passive homes

The term 'passive house' refers to a voluntary building standard developed in Germany in the 1980s that saves up to 90% on space heating and cooling energy. The focus is on minimising the building's energy loss while ensuring a healthy living environment for the occupants.

The first passive house was built in Germany by Dr Wolfgang Feist, after which he developed a tool, The Passive House Planning Package, that can predict energy use for any building before construction starts. This enables an accurate evaluation of the building, without over-specifying for little or no gain.


Key components to passive homes include correct foundations and wall construction; window placement, frames and glazing; orientation and shading; airtightness and ventilation.

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The house may look stunning but as Philip points out, the products used are considered mid-range in Europe and America. He estimates that to include passive house technologies and products costs just 10-15% more than normal. "My theory is that if you took 10% off the size of the house, then you could afford to build this way without having to increase your budget."

Or you could just consider the payback on running costs. Despite the 300sq m house having many floor-to-ceiling windows and an openplan living area with a vaulted ceiling, the winter electricity bills are just \$60 a month. There are no heating appliances in the house and its design keeps the house at a comfortable 20°C all year round.

Says Philip: "We can get away with these big windows and large spaces here in Auckland but you might have to rethink the design if you lived in Christchurch, for example."

The large sliding doors that face north and lead off the main living area close with an airtight locking mechanism so that no warmth escapes. Some of the windows open inwards rather than out with side hinges, but then also tilt from top to bottom for ventilation and security. In summer, external electronic shutters glide across the windows to block the sun's heat.

The cladding is multi-layered including two air cavities, insulation, the external cedar weatherboard and an eco-ply with bracing properties.

The exterior of the house is finished in Resene Waterborne Woodsman CoolColour stain tinted to Resene Treehouse. Inside, Resene Zylone Sheen VOC Free paint was chosen for better indoor air quality.

A home ventilation system that is certified for use in a passive home comes from Europe and is key to providing clean, pollen and dust free air and eliminating moisture and odours. It refreshes the air while keeping the internal temperature stable.


Keeping the house up off the ground is important – if the ground temperature is 15°C and you want the inside of the house to be 20°C, you're effectively heating up the ground as well. The house's concrete foundations and floor slab are therefore isolated from the ground by continuous insulation made of high-density polystyrene.

The beauty about passive house principles is that they can be applied to any house design – be it a bespoke designer home like the Ivanier's or a modest off-the-shelf cottage. The couple's dream is to influence central government to use passive home principles in new social housing to not only reduce running costs for low-income occupants but to keep their families healthy. H














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colour out of confusion

Christchurch has a creative answer to a shaken-up CBD.





Coralie Winn is one pivotal power-house – albeit an increasingly tired one - of the post-earthquake Christchurch City phenomenon called Gap Filler.

Gap Filler was begun by a few creative souls in the wake of the initial September 2010 earthquake to temporarily 'activate' the many blank sites of ex-demolition wasteland that were fast populating the city. These sites have now become backdrops, art galleries, or places to congregate for dancing, live music, or tournaments. The initiative was scaled up after the February 2011 disaster and is now a charitable trust; Coralie certainly has her work cut out.

Gap Filler projects are always unexpected, off-beat or thoughtprovoking, nearly always colourful. And to many GF undertakings, Resene has donated many litres of recycled waterborne paint.

Creative New Zealand, the Tindall Foundation, the Todd Foundation, the Canterbury Community Trust, and the Vodafone Canterbury Fund have all been financial donors.

Sometimes a vacant lot will feature little more than rubble or bits of mangled metal. But what's left might be a safe wall; a seismically strong side of a neighbouring building. This will then be used as an artist's canvas, such as the one at left by Melbourne artist Ash Keating and created using fire extinguishers charged with Resene paint. His dynamic work aims to provoke questions about how widely tilt-slab concrete should be used in the city's rebuild.

Another large wall mural features a shadow-board of tools. It's a reminder of all the necessary, practical items rendered inaccessible and lost forever as a result of the quakes.

A recent project requiring hundreds of volunteers was the Summer Pallet Pavilion, conceived as a seasonal space for events. Built from 3000 blue wooden pallets, it houses a secret garden as an oasis amidst rubble and emptiness.

Coralie believes the Gap Filler initiative is psychologically and socially necessary for Christchurch people. While the rest of the world moved on, locals were left without the meeting places, bars, restaurants, art galleries and venues which made life in the city vibrant and interesting. Landmark buildings have been replaced with what looks like a vast, moon-surfaced car park. Says Coralie: "Everyone realises the rebuild will take years; decades even. So by temporarily filling areas with positive, colourful, quirky spaces to hang out in, we're rejecting the passive 'wait for things to happen' mentality."

She's amazed by how many people have been willing to volunteer time, money or recycled materials. Getting the community involved has been good, she enthuses. "People in responsible positions in the post-quake city are now exhausted. That's why it's great for volunteers to be rebuilding the city in this way.

"I am here to make sure people can engage with a colourful central city again. Getting involved with Gap Filler is a way of processing what's happened here, and making something creative and resourceful emerge from it. We're helping create a new identity for this city here and now. It's exciting!" H



make a bin locker

Wheelie bins are a practical fact of life in many of our cities and towns... but they're not the most attractive of items. Here's a smart way to keep them out of sight.



You will need:

- 100mm x 100mm dressed H4 treated post for the corner (1.8m long)
- 75mm x 50mm dressed H3 treated timber for vertical framing of gates and side panel (6m)
- 100mm x 40mm dressed H3 treated timber for horizontal framing (5m)
- 90mm x 50mm dressed H3 treated timber to fix gate to house (1.2m)
- Dressed H3 treated palings we used 20m each of 50mm x 25mm and 75mm x 25mm for our contemporary look but you can use just one size if you prefer
- Stainless steel screws 1 pack of 50mm square head and 1 pack of 75mm square head
- Coach screws for fixing to the house and existing post
- 25kg bag of rapid-set concrete
- 4 galvanised hinges and screws
- · Gate lock and screws
- Resene Lumbersider tinted to your desired colour – we used Resene Silver Sand

Tools, from Hirepool: post-hole borer; mitre saw; circular saw; battery-powered drill and bits; belt sander and 80-grit paper; trowel; spirit level; four clamps; extension cord; ear plugs; safety glasses.

Step 1Decide on your paling pattern. We used two widths of paling and set them over two different heights. Bore a hole for the corner post and concrete in. Leave to set. Measure and cut the timber, and pre-paint.

Step 4Drill and screw one of the gates to the main post then drill and screw the other gate to the smaller post and attach to the house.

Step 2Make up the side panel frame and attach the palings. Make the two gates and attach the gate hinges.

Step 5

Clamp the gates together then attach the gate lock.

Step 3

Drill and screw the side panel to the corner post and any existing structure using clamps to steady it - in this case it's the house and a veranda post.

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Prefab homes used to be cheap and plain. But with designer input and improved technologies, these homes are a solution for now and the future.

When Georgina Pearce's bungalow in the Christchurch suburb of Burwood was written off after the Canterbury earthquakes, she didn't want to move elsewhere in the city. But it would be months before she could even get site consent to build a new home on her own property let alone construct a house using conventional methods.

Her son Alan had a brain wave. He suggested buying a prefabricated home with pre-approved building consent that could be built off-site and so save time. At a cost of just \$163,000 from Laing Properties, the 95sq m Mamaku house fitted her needs and budget exactly.

Building consent was issued for the foundations in late July 2012 and construction began in August. By this time, the house was already under construction in Laing's yard. Says Grant Laing: "With a conventional house, you can't begin construction of the new home until the site consent is obtained. Compared to building a conventional house, Georgina saved at least three months in construction time."

She is thrilled with her new home. With interiors painted in various strengths of Resene Tea, "it's sunny, bright and so warm compared with my old house, thanks to double glazing and it's very wellfinished."



This type of quick-build, pre-built home is perfect for people on Christchurch's TC3 zoned sections where houses have been written off and lighter-weight structures are recommended.

Laing Properties was one of several firms promoting quality prefabrication techniques and high speed construction at the Christchurch Hive project, launched by PrefabNZ in April 2012. The project was inspired by the desperate need for new homes that are lightweight, quick to build, strong and affordable to cater for those affected by the earthquakes that have ravaged the region since September 2010.

CEO of PrefabNZ Pamela Bell said Hive showed house hunters a range of different styles. Catering to savvy, eco-conscious buyers, they also demonstrated a clear designer edge.

In the past, explains Liz O'Neill of Laing Properties: "Quick build homes were relatively basic, because that was all that was required by customers. The majority of prefab clients were after basic quick-build houses for fast accommodation. Now, however, clients want more of a 'wow' factor in their home, even if it is prefab. The prefab industry has evolved to incorporate a more modern architecturally designed look to keep up with the trends of the day."

Architect Andre Hodgskin of Architex teamed up with Keith Hay Homes to produce the beautifully crafted Park Terrace home at Hive. He says the association resulted from mutual philosophies. "They build excellent buildings. And we enjoy designing them. So we decided to explore that synergy. Park Terrace is a generous home which contains many design elements often used in our bespoke commissions."

He believes there are universal issues at stake. "Key concerns are costeffective building methods and materials. We tend to live more in >

Resene Bokara Grey the now than plan for the future. Fuelled by the rapid advance in technologies along with ecological concerns, we have an opportunity to lead the world by example, treading lightly on the earth and leaving a small but meaningful footprint."

Andre says we need to find more appropriate ways of building in response to our evolving attitude towards the way in which we live. "We should explore lighter buildings with tighter spaces in increased densities – shared community spaces and facilities as opposed to individual indulgences which create urban sprawl."

Andre also created the award-winning low-impact, modular Bachkit in 1999 which could be constructed in just 16 weeks. Grant McKenzie bought the Bachkit business and has sold the homes internationally.

The design may be clean-lined but it's not basic. And today's designer prefabricated homes aren't necessarily cheap. Grant points to the level of prefabrication which is becoming more sophisticated and complex: "Components by their very nature are expensive... It's very much a quality home and it's hard to cut costs," he says.

Box Living is another successful company working in this arena, established with the promise of quality spaces, cost certainty and good value. Around half of Box Living homes have been bought as holiday homes and the company has tackled many difficult sites.

Box Living's Dan Heyworth believes prefabs are the way of the future. "We need to see more standardisation in materials and material sizes, more 'systems' comprising pre-built components assembled on site."

In line with the design's modernist influences, Box Living homes are painted in dark Resene colours using Resene CoolColour paint, which not only gives them a designer look, but helps them to blend into natural environments and withstand strong sunlight.

Prefab building is a theme being increasingly explored: Puke Ariki Museum in New Plymouth has hosted a summer-long exhibition called Kiwi Prefab, Cottage to Cutting Edge.

This often overlooked sector looks as if it has a big future ahead. H

Built from three shipping containers that cost \$2500 each, this Rarotonga home is the epitome of a quick-build, low-cost, recycled home. Owned by Susan and Neil Hall, and designed by Nigel Rees from RDA Design and Susan, the containers were bought in New Zealand and transported to the Cook Islands in 2010.

Surrounded by 100sq m of kwila decking, a high-pitched floating roof of square profile, long-run Colorsteel protects the containers. Laid in an L shape, the master bedroom, dressing room and bathroom are located in the foot while the living area is in the longer space.

Door and window openings were cut into the containers with the bedroom and living areas all opening onto the back deck. Slatted pine roller doors were made on-site and fitted with internal insect screens concealed in the walls. Resene CoolColour paint tinted to Resene Black has been used on the exterior.



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dealing to the damp

It's unhealthy, hikes up our power bills, ruins soft furnishings and can rot the very structure of our houses. But condensation is all too common in our homes.

Resene Meltwater

We all know the catch phrase: a dry home is a healthy home. But many of us wake to windows streaked with water droplets or condensation sitting on bathroom walls. Then there's the mould growing in the corners of the ceiling, or a damp musty smell in the wardrobes. Having to wipe down windows and walls, and scrub blackened ceilings isn't just annoying, it's a sign that our homes aren't providing a dry, healthy living environment. And with our high asthma rate, it's crucial that we deal with condensation issues before another cold winter arrives.

How does condensation form?

The process happens when warm water vapour in the air hits a non-absorbent cold surface, such as a window, wall, ceiling or porcelain vanity, and condenses to form small water droplets. Often we don't even notice the condensation until mould starts to grow on that surface. But these mould spores can cause everything from minor immune responses to asthma and headaches, dizziness and depression, and in extreme cases, death.

What's more, condensation can also gradually destroy our home and possessions. Over time, it causes timber and particle board to stain and rot, and can damage carpets, curtains and furniture, as well as clothing and mattresses.

Damp homes are also harder and more expensive to heat because in the process of drying out, wet building materials remove some of the warmth from the air.

Condensation culprits:

- · Clothes left drying inside on racks
- Unflued gas and kerosene heaters
- Lack of good extractors
- Showering/bathing, especially with the door open
- Steam from cooking and boiling jugs
- Unvented tumble dryers and bathrooms
- · Humans produce 500ml to 800ml of moisture a day through respiration and perspiration

What can we do about it?

Keeping out moisture doesn't mean sealing your house up tight. In fact, this is one of the contributing factors to condensation in our homes - they're left firmly closed up and cold for most of the day. We then come home, take a hot shower, boil the jug for a cuppa and switch the gas heater on high to try and warm up. The result is more condensation as this hot, wet air hits cold surfaces.

There are, however, homes designed to be airtight but that use a robust home ventilation system that filters the air as it comes in, ridding it of moisture, pollens and pollutants, and then extracts any stale or moist air from inside and expels it. These systems can, of course, be retrofitted into any house to improve air quality.

The key to combating condensation lies in adequate ventilation and maintaining a constant indoor temperature through efficient heating and insulation. Moist air needs to be able to escape outside, but too much ventilation will make a house draughty and cold. Striking the right balance is vital.

You can improve indoor air circulation by opening windows and doors on dry days. If condensation is occurring on outside walls behind furniture such as couches and beds, move them out from the walls so air can circulate around these cold areas.

Too much ventilation (ie. cold draughts) will make a home harder to heat, and an inadequately heated home will in turn encourage condensation. In winter, aim to keep the indoor temperature at a minimum of 16°C (WHO recommendation) or at least 7°C warmer than the outdoor temperature.

However, here's the catch: the way we heat our homes can actually contribute to the condensation problem. Bottled gas and kerosene heaters release up to a litre of water an hour into the air. Costeffective, wall-mounted panel heaters fitted with timers are a much better option. Or you could invest in a heat pump or central heating, or install a DVS system, which takes warm air from the ceiling space and slowly pushes it into the house to provide a positive pressure that forces damp air outside.

Insulating your walls and ceiling, and installing double glazing will keep your house warmer and make it easier and cheaper to heat. By warming up the surfaces of walls and ceilings, you're providing fewer cold surfaces on which water vapour can condense. Drawing wellfitted, heavy curtains at night will help keep in heat gained from the sun during the day.

Rooms on the southern side of your house or those shaded by trees are more susceptible to damp and humidity so keep a close check on these parts of your home. Dehumidifiers can be expensive to run, but they are a good short-term solution to dry out particularly damp

Keeping dry

- Open doors and windows on fine days so air can circulate through your home.
- Lift curtains and pull furniture back from the walls to create space for air circulation.
- Ensure curtains extend right to the floor and that they include a separate thermal/blockout fabric layer, like those offered in the Resene Curtain Collection.
- Air mattresses and pillows in the sun to dry any residual moisture.
- Bathrooms and kitchens should be well ventilated. Install extractor fans over cooktops and in bathrooms to remove steam. Use Resene SpaceCote Kitchen & Bathroom paint which combines anti-bacterial silver protection and MoulDefender mould inhibitor.
- Avoid drying clothes indoors and vent tumble dryers to outside.
- Open windows or use an extractor fan in the bathroom when showering. Leave it on for 30 minutes afterwards with the door closed to remove moist air.
- Place draught-stops beneath doors to keep rooms warm.
- Wipe up any condensation on windows or sills straight away.
- Periodically leave cupboard and wardrobe doors open so air can circulate. And never put damp shoes or clothes in a wardrobe.

How much humidity?

Ideally, the humidity level in your home should be no more than 50%. Mould requires a relative humidity level of 65-70% to grow. Hardware shops stock cheap humidity meters to easily monitor levels.

hen your outlook is across a narrow patch of grass at the tranquil waters of the Firth of Thames, what better colour to paint your kitchen than a soothing pale blue Resene Comfort Zone? All the better when the slightly retro appeal of that shade suits the bach it sits within - which has been cleverly crafted from an old tram. Blue is also the owner Lynn Plom's favourite colour and Resene Comfort Zone has also been used on the bach exterior.

Tram 53 last carried passengers in the early 1950s. It sat along with others in a paddock for years before 23 of them were moved onto a waterfront site on the western shores of the Coromandel Peninsula. Converted to baches, they are in varying states of style and repair.

When Lynn and husband Martin bought theirs two years ago, it had a hodge-podge of add-ons and water tanks. With strict rules on what you can do to the trams and how much you can add, they used the existing 67 sq m footprint but re-built the additions and rationalised the interior layout. It has been an "affordable and adorable" bach



solution for a man who loves fishing and a couple who owns a busy kitchen cabinetry business, Elite Kitchens and Cabinets.

The kitchen has been kept in the same place but instead of an old watertank on the front wall, there is now a large window to look out over the sea. The previous owners left everything in the bach, so Lynn makes good use of old Crown Lynn crockery – "the cups are the perfect size for a good cappuccino."

Lynn has used some clever design elements to make use of the space, and make the room appear larger. The end bench is narrow with no cupboards underneath, "because you lose a lot of storage in corner cupboards." The wall cupboards above have sliding doors because hinged ones would open into the room and be too intrusive, and have finely ribbed retro-looking glass so that they appear lighter. Quirky asymmetric handles complete the look. Also, the microwave cupboard doors open, then slot back into a space beside the cabinet.

Other cupboards are fitted with various pantry systems. Instead of a regular rangehood which would protrude too much, Lynn chose a funky circular wall-mounted version from Hafele. A wall pantry was made only 450mm deep and sits on the table side of the door.

A bench seat is built in next to the refurbished 1950s-style chromelegged Formica table, because "bench seats fit more bottoms"; there is also storage underneath. "It's a lovely space to be in. It's raised up slightly so you feel like the water is coming right up to the house. And the sunsets are legendary," says Lynn.

The shape of the retro-style Smeg fridge perfectly echoes that of the old tram door beside it. Above the door, you can see the end of the old tram roof protruding from the wall. The walls are Resene Alabaster. A strip of mosaic-style tiles in various shades of blue fits with the scheme perfectly and is joined by a glass splashback.

The benchtop, which is Laminex Caesarstone Mosaici Marrone, is made of recycled material and was chosen because it looks like old terrazzo. It's inset with an 'indestructible' white Silgranit sink from Hafele. The flooring is a timber-look vinyl tile from Karndean. "If we had used sheet vinyl, there would have been too much wastage." The vinyl tile is also used in the rest of the tram.

In all, Lynn and Martin have managed to make what they say is a "pretty flash" kitchen look perfectly at home in its humble converted tram. H





here's a certain mystique to the Auckland suburb of Titirangi. Its tree-clad slopes, shady dells, native birdlife and magical peeps of the Manukau Harbour make it feel far from the city. But those very elements make it tricky for establishing a garden with its short sunlight hours, poor soil and sticky clay.

When Jono Sagar and Neil Sparkman bought a home there, it was a forgotten 1970s property in desperate need of a makeover. They wanted their house to merge and connect with the land, and to

recreate the sense of sanctuary associated with resorts they had visited in Asia so that every day would feel like a mini escape when they came home.

Jono and Neil called on landscape designer Jules Moore to create a new garden. The garden's sloping section dominated the landscape so creating a flat area for outdoor living with a cut and fill approach was the only option. The terrace is now finished in concrete blocks painted in Resene Gravel.

The rest of the garden was too steep for more structured retaining, so Jules optimised the natural terrain by using steps and paths to create more of a rambling feel.

Looking from the entry at the top of the garden to the lower realms, the design takes you on a journey through many levels and on to the bush. This tucked-away aspect is much loved by the couple. >

Says Jono: "The garden is guite low down so we can hide out here and let the world go by. You come down into the garden and look out towards the ocean."

They also love the connection between the house and garden, which is great for entertaining. The property coped well when they held a Christmas party for 120.

It's quite a green garden so stays looking good year-round," says Jono. "I like the different textures and shapes – spiky, smooth, rough and shiny - as well as the different greens."

Mosses and rocks work in well with their collection of statues, with the garden evolving into more of a carefree collection of bromeliads and foliage plants.

While some plantings are guite structured, like the lepidozamia cycad underplanted with black mondo, other areas are less defined and are an eclectic mix of the owner's favourite plants – added to and moved around over the course of three years while the garden was being created.

The upper levels of the garden has a different feel altogether. Here, the aim was to create a more contemporary style, but not let the concrete block retaining walls make the entertaining area feel too closed in.

The design needed to be minimal yet practical, while also incorporating long block walls and enabling people to move from one level to another with ease.

Including a water rill resolved the visual problems by introducing another level in front of the long block wall. Alongside this, a metrewide boardwalk was built to connect the house to the outdoor dining and day-bed area.

Made from kwila and stained dark brown, the boardwalk is a stunning contrast between the grey paving stones and the natural bamboo screens. Various poles and timbers around the house are finished in Resene Nero.

Either side, tapered and aged stone pots hold simple plantings of bamboo to continue the Asian theme.

Looking out from the house, if it weren't for the tui and wood pigeons flying by, you could be forgiven for thinking you had been transported to a tropical hideaway. H




a vibrant and fiery fun solution



Bill Holden of Design and Landscape suggests this alternative scheme:

The new plan is designed to add vibrance and usability to this space. The lower timber deck has been replaced with a second pond below the existing pond, linked with a curtain waterfall on the corner to introduce moving water, and populated with water lilies and goldfish. The walls on the left have been given added life and fun with the metallic paint Resene Treasure Chest, which would look spectacular with outdoor lights or flares sparkling off it. If metallic is too much, you could use Resene Sandbar instead. The vibrant orange Resene Big Bang is used for the other walls. The deck has been used as seating by adding brightly covered squabs, while outdoor dining is catered for with a quality outdoor furniture setting including a large umbrella. New planting includes orange-flowered clivia, and native irises.

Landscape designer **Lyndell Shannon** suggests this alternative scheme:

with grasses and alpine flowers. Natural elements combine with clean contemporary lines, grasses and small flowering plants. The original high wall has been lowered and painted in Resene Double Ash. Planting at ground level lets users feel part of the garden. A simple stainless steel spout feeds a pool surrounded by rocks. The rocks interrupt strips of stainless steel that form part of the pool edge, the garden edge, and dividers in the exposed aggregate concrete courtyard surface. A manuka twig gate provides another contrast between rough and smooth. Plants include red tussock, carex, mountain cabbage trees and kawaka. A succession of small plants flower in different seasons. Colours are subtle and furniture is light and unobtrusive, such as Flutter Design's version of the classic butterfly chair. Lisa Sarah's stainless steel sculptures sit among the plants.

Method:

Step \ Borrow a book from the library on flags of the world or look them up on the internet. Decide which flags you want to put on the front of your cloth boxes. We picked flags with simple shapes because they are easier to paint: They are from the United Kingdom, Palau, Italy and Switzerland.

Step 2 Photocopy or print off larger images of the flags you chose to use as a reference. Use the side of the cloth box without a handle or hole. Then use the pencil and ruler to make your painting guides, altering the images to fit a square as necessary. If you are using a flag with a circle, for example the Palau flag, centre a bowl on the box and draw round it.

Step 3 Start painting. We used Resene Bright Spark (yellow) and Resene Sports Star (blue) for Palau; Resene Kermit (green) and Resene Rocket (red) for Italy; Resene Rocket (red) for Switzerland; and Resene Rocket (red) and Resene Surfs Up (dark blue) for the United Kingdom. Use the small brush to do the outlines then fill in with the larger brush. Let one colour dry completely before starting the next.

When they are all dry, pop them inside the frame! H

hints and ideas

- Make up your own flag designs using colours and forms you like.
- Use the colours of your favourite sports teams instead or just paint a design on the front of the fabric boxes.
- Get mum or dad to help you draw on the designs, or paint on the straight lines, then you can paint in the colour.
- If you want, use masking tape down the outside of the straight lines and paint inside that.
- When you feel like a change, just paint over the existing pattern or turn them round and start again!







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
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
